



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS: THE POWER OF EDUCATION

ELANA'S STORY

We adopted our daughter, Allyson from China when she was 23 months old. She was born prematurely at 31 weeks old and spent 52 days in the hospital neonatal unit. These **early traumas led to a lot of violent episodes** of her waking up from naps kicking and screaming for the first 1.5 years she was with us. In addition, she had very little appetite and would often rake her fingers over her face and pull her hair.

Thankfully through prayer and God's grace, many of these initial outward expressions of trauma eventually disappeared. However, there were still internal ones left behind. These dysregulated states would come when she had difficulties in doing her homework or when we would try to discipline her. We soon became very frustrated, exhausted, and felt very alone in this journey as many of our friends could not relate to our challenges.

We thank God that we found a Help One Child adoption support group.

Here we found a supportive environment with others going through similar experiences. It has been a safe place to share & relate, learn new parenting tools around children coming from hard places, and pray for one another.

We also recently attended a Hope for the Journey conference organized by HOC. The 2-day conference helped us to better understand the importance of addressing the child's need to feel safe when they begin to get dysregulated and act out, and how to compassionately and more effectively extend care during these times. And, after only implementing some of these techniques for a month now, we have seen improvements. We are slowly teaching her how to voice her thoughts and needs in more constructive ways. We thank God for the Help One Child ministry, its dedicated & caring staff, and are very grateful to all the generous supporters who make it possible!



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS: COMMUNITY



"My experience with Dads + Donuts has been absolutely wonderful. To know that there's a **common thread in terms of our faiths and heart for fostering** is what I never knew I needed. Learning from the experiences of other foster/adoptive dads, and also just sharing stories and updates from our lives has been a huge encouragement, particularly when we've had placements enter/leave our family. I'm very thankful for this ministry, for those who make it happen, and also for the **friendships being built** with the other dads!" - Stephen, Foster Dad

"Our support group was a great way for our son to see other families like his and helped 'normalize' our situation. It has helped our son gain confidence and create a personal narrative to use when speaking to peers about foster care and adoption. The friendships we've developed through the group have been a lifeline. When I went through intense cancer treatment, our group was there for us in every way and we could not have made it through without them. My husband and I have gained lots of practical knowledge and greater insight into the challenges of kids and families from hard places. It's an opportunity to vent, learn, pray, cry, and laugh with others who really 'get it'. It has been fun seeing our kids grow up together!" - Amanda





"The Help One Child support group made an enormous difference for me. The challenges and complexities of being in an adoptive family had felt isolating since most of my friends and relatives did not understand the unique situation and dynamic of my family. I felt understood and connected in the HOC support group and learned so much from the experience of the group members and from the educational components of the group. "You gave me the opportunity to begin tutoring Lorena Peña, now Lorena Sterne, on FaceTime 26 months ago, in April 2020. She had left her friends and much of her family behind the year before, immigrating from El Salvador as a 15-year-old to the USA. Not long after arriving, speaking little English at the time, she abruptly had to be removed from her home, entering the system and being received by another family better than 100 miles away. She experienced being in courtrooms in front of judges and sadly, deaths in her immediate family. When adoption didn't work out, she was told to start from scratch again. She was relocated once more, eventually being adopted by a loving woman who is also a teacher at her high school.

She and I have many things in common, such as having to change high schools only a year before graduating. Other experiences of hers I didn't have, one being her straight A's in physics. I'm still relieved I passed that class with a B.

After more than two years of sharing time with her on FaceTime, just today I was blessed with the chance to meet her in person, face to face, for the very first time. Lorena graduated with honors, multiple awards and a 3.9 GPA from Sequoia High School in Redwood City. Beyond words can express, I am forever humbled and thankful for this opportunity. A request came in for storage fees. A mother was re-entering residential treatment after a recent relapse and had no way to pay for the storage of all the family's items in the meantime. This was this mother's last chance to get sober and reunify with her ten-year-old son. Two churches immediately stepped up to cover the fees.

The social worker stated, "CarePortal responded to a need I had no other way of meeting. Getting this mom's storage paid for while she goes to residential treatment was very important and supported her in doing what she has to in order to reunify with her child. I strongly agree that meeting this need supported me in my work and improved the well-being of the family/child involved."



VISION FOR THE FUTURE

What would it look like for the foster care system to be impacted by the faith community? What would it look like if it wasn't just about the one crazy family in a church willing to welcome youth in their moment of need, but an entire community within a church, within a county, and across the bay? This community, once equipped and positioned with opportunities to wrap around that family, vulnerable youth, the biological family, and the social worker, this community will make a far greater impact than just the one crazy family.

At Help One Child we see this lived out through all our support programs. There is a collective, bringing what they have to contribute to bolstering the vulnerable youth we serve; it's a pooling of resources and gifts.

Each has something to bring to the table: some have money, others have compassion, others have the know-how/experience, and others do the difficult work of putting themselves in uncomfortable situations, because if they don't, who will?

But in the end, it takes us all. So when I dream of what it would look like, I am blessed by the glimpses I get to see played out through our programming. This past year, we saw more children served by our programs, and done so through the hands and feet of the faith community across the bay area. Will you help us see that multiplied? Will you help encourage those in your community to find a place at our table and join this collective that is making an impact?

I look forward to seeing this dream become a reality through your partnership.
